English Language Arts

- Ask and answer questions about a text using supporting evidence
- Describe the basic elements of fiction
- Compare ideas, characters, events, and settings in stories
- Increase reading fluency and comprehension with narrative and informational text
- Recognize and understand key features of informational text
- Write narratives with descriptive details and clear sequenced events.
- Write opinions about topics with supporting evidence.
- Conduct short research projects to build knowledge about a topic
- Build spelling, phonemic awareness, vocabulary and phonic word recognition

Science

Students will focus on:

- Forces and interaction
- Life Science
- Earth Science

Throughout each unit, students will design and carry out investigations using observations and data collection to reach logical conclusions about a topic.

Social Studies

Students will examine fundamental concepts in:

- history
- geography
- civics & government
- economics
- public discourse, decision making & citizen involvement

with a focus on early Michigan history through statehood.

Math

- Fluently multiply and divide within 100
- Estimating the sums and differences of two numbers up to three digits
- Solve two-step word problems using the four operations.
- Add and subtract whole numbers with and without regrouping within 1,000
- Identify and name place value up to 6 digits
- Compare fractions on a number line.
- Understand the names and properties of 2D shapes
- Understand and calculate the measurement of perimeter and area
- Interpret, construct, and analyze graphs
